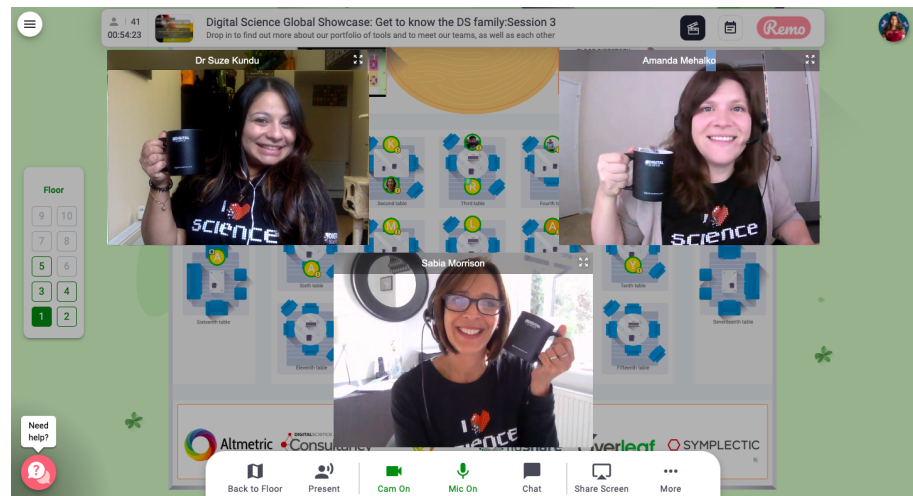

Welcome to our first ever Global Showcase

The Digital Science Family today welcomed hundreds of attendees to Day 1 of the first ever Digital Science Global Showcase! Spanning four 'Getting to Know You' sessions, attendees took to the virtual conferencing platform Remo to network with other attendees across five floors, each set out with 19 tables.

All attendees were called to the stage to watch 1-minute lightning talks from every Digital Science portfolio team, each talking about how they work to make research the best it can be. Attendees then returned to networking, with many people choosing to meet with our product reps based on dedicated tables on the 2nd floor. The lightning talks will be available to view on-demand in Remo in any of this week's networking sessions, taking place after the main sessions.

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Showcase Themes

We love our Showcase events because we can bring together our partners and collaborators to learn about the range of innovative ways they have been using our tools to make research more efficient and effective. Usually the number of attendees is limited by the size of our venue, but thankfully there is no such restriction in an online event.

While hosting this event virtually is great for the environment, it also means that our Showcase is a truly global event. We are welcoming attendees from 93 countries, and from all sectors of research. The conference themes that we have chosen reflect our global research community, and we know that there will be something for everyone, whatever sector of research you work in, and wherever you are based.



We have a packed schedule of sessions over the next four days, spread across the following four themes, so don't forget to save your spot!

Collaboration (Tuesday 29 September): Discover how our research tools are enabling members of the research community to work together openly and collaboratively.

Research Culture (Wednesday 30 September): Find out how we are working with our partners to push for an inclusive, open, and efficient research culture.

Truth & Trust (Thursday 1 October): To build trust in research we require transparency of our actions. In these sessions we will be discussing accountability and responsibility in research.

Global Challenges (Friday 2 October): The current pandemic has connected the world in ways we could never have imagined possible but there remain many other global challenges for researchers to solve. These sessions will deliver an insight into how our tools and analyses are contributing to research successes in the face of various global challenges.

DAY 1 MUG SHOT: Meet Paul Naish

Paul Naish is Global Head of Portfolio at Taylor & Francis Journals, working primarily in mathematics and statistics, but also some history and philosophy of science. Paul is very much looking forward to a number of the #DSGlobal2020 sessions, including the Overleaf collaboration session (as he has an interest in LaTeX workflows and is keen to find out more), the Altmetric product focus session (Paul is an avid tweeter, but is also more generally interested in science communication), and the session on the Responsible Communication of Research (Paul publishes a journal on this, the Journal of Responsible Innovation, so this is a key subject for him). In his role at Taylor & Francis, Paul is currently working on journal development with a focus on quality, impact, and dissemination, as well as developing new journals and products. Paul is also very interested in learning more about Open Science and Open Research and how we can ensure the widest possible access to the research we publish.
